Oscar BARBERÀ is Lecturer at the University of Valencia since 2009. He was Visiting Fellow at the London School of Economics and Political Science (2007-2009) and Lecturer at the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona (2004-2007) and at the Universitat Oberta de Catalunya (2002-2008). He spent research stays at the University of Edinburgh (2011), Università degli Studi di Firenze (2010) and at the Université Catholique de Louvain (2005). His PhD thesis received the 2007 Award of the Spanish Political Science Association. His research focuses on political parties, political elites, party members and activists and decentralisation. He is member of SEDEPE (Selection and Deselection of Political Elites), the IPSA Research Committee on Political Elites, the IPSA Research Committee on Political Sociology, and the MAPP working group (Members and Activists of Political Parties).

Astrid BARRIO is Senior Lecturer at the University of Valencia. She obtained her PhD in Political Science and Administration at the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona and her DEA in Etudes Politiques in Sciences-Po. Her PhD dissertation received the Spanish Political Science Association 2008 Award. Her research agenda focuses on party politics and party members. She has been Visiting Fellow in the Centre d'Etudes Politiques de l'Europe Latine (CEPEL) and have also been Part-Time Lecturer in the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona (2002-2008) and ESADE (2001-2007).
